### From Homeless to Hired: Jeffery's Story

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), the job market for forklift drivers will continue to grow into 2020 and the next decade. A recent job market study indicated 3-4% job growth for forklift drivers through 2024, which is about on pace with other manufacturing related employees.

Hard work, commitment to self, and skills training took FEC member Jeffery Kreisel out of the shelter and into a management position.

Jeffery Kreisel lived at the City Union Mission Christian Life Center, a local shelter for the homeless in Kansas City. Last June, he toured the Warehouseman Training Inc. facility, and decided to invest the time and effort in training.

Since finances were a challenge, Jeffery enrolled as a member of the Full Employment Council, where he received financial aid and supportive services as he participated in the Tech Hire program, allowing him to enroll in Warehouseman Training Inc.

Through the program, Jeffery earned his Certified Warehouseman and Material Handler Certification, OSHA PIT Safety Certification, Operator's License on Classes I, II and III, as well as his OSHA 10 Hour Safety Course.

"Jeffery has an excellent attitude. He is respectful, hardworking, and follows instructions well. He was early every day. Jeffery fully participated in the class and had good input. He was always ready for the morning review and could answer most questions put to him," said instructor Doran Clevenger.

Upon completion of his training, Jeffery went to work through Express Employment at the Smithfield Foods, Kansas City Sausage Company. He began driving a forklift for them, making \$15 an hour. Before too long, he put in his application for the second shift lead position.

Now, Jeffery makes \$18.50 an hour, and has left the homeless shelter behind. He now lives on his own, working a job he enjoys.

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# THE FEC ANNOUNCES PARTNERSHIP WITH ENTERPRISE BANK & TRUST FOR 'GET FIT' INITIATIVE

A \$50,000 investment from Enterprise Bank & Trust will allow the Full Employment Council to serve 60 typically underserved populations, providing them with needed skills and an opportunity to give back to their community.

The partnership will allow the FEC to provide a variety of technology skills training, and enhance its IT Infrastructure, which will increase access to clients. These clients can continue to use the FEC's 1740 Paseo location as a hub of career and educational activities, with access to technology, and staff on hand to help.

The initiative will also allow for paid internships for graduates of technical courses. These internships will focus on nonprofit organizations, small businesses, minority-owned businesses, and businesses in the urban corps. Participants will also engage in community service projects.

The partnership with Enterprise will also create the Financial Management Academy. This academy will help participants learn about financial literacy, teach skills such as how to build credit, establish banking relationships, and how to navigate major financial obligations, such as renting an apartment or purchasing a home.

"The 'Get Fit' initiative aligns our clients with in-demand skills training, financial management prowess and the opportunity to engage in community service by giving back shared knowledge in the technology field," said Penn.

### Following in their footsteps

Divinity Kindred learned about the Full Employment Council and its services during a presentation given during her HiSET class. She knew she wanted to follow in the footsteps of her mom and her aunt, both nurses, so she signed up for debt-free skills training.

After completing her HiSET, Divinity worked with Full Employment Council counselor Judith Rollison, who helped her find a job as a home health aide. This paid work experience through the FEC allowed Divinity some firsthand experience in nursing. Then, her FEC counselor helped her enroll in the CNA program through FEC training partner MEDS KC, funded by the HITE program. Divinity even received additional financial support that paid for her uniforms and provided gas cards so she could get back and forth to class.

Once she graduated, her counselor helped her find a full-time job at a local nursing home, allowing Divinity to make more money, working in the field for which she trained. Now, she plans to buy a new car, and hopes to help her mom with house expenses.

"I have a job doing what I love," said Divinity – just like her mom and her aunt before her. "I'm grateful for the opportunity FEC/HITE provided me. It made me change myself and now I'm moving forward."

### **Healthcare Heroes**

#### A Spotlight on Healthcare Training

James Kelly (left), father of five, knew that his current job wasn't what he wanted to do or where he wanted to be. He found himself unsatisfied in his line of work. He wanted something more. After searching online, he found out about the Full Employment Council, and he decided to reach out.

Dee Burns, Full Employment Council counselor, worked with James, and told James about the Medical Assistant Certificate program through FEC training partner Wellspring, and funded through the HITE program. But Dee Burns helped with more than just a career path.

"Dee helped me with scholarship assistance, accountability and encouragement," said James. "Any and all the help I asked for and some I didn't!"

"My family also supported me the entire time I was following my dream of education," James added, saying that his family notices a big difference in him, happier and more motivated than he's ever been.

James really appreciated the classroom discussions, paired with the hands-on-training labs, which prepared him for his new career as a Medical Assistant. He completed his training in December of 2020, at the top of his class, with a 4.0 GPA. He is now employed within his field at Midwest Heart and Vascular.

"I am gaining additional stability and support for my family," said James.

His new career has opened up additional paths for James. "This program has pushed me to consider furthering my education to a higher level, while working at a position I love," he said.


